As of December 1, 2022, USEF's new Non-Member/show Pass rules are in effect for USEF recognized shows. Important highlights:

- Each person can only purchase a single USEF show Pass per competition year, which allows them to compete in non-exempt classes at a *single* USEF recognized show. After that, they must purchase a USEF membership.
- Trainers and coaches must have an active membership and CANNOT purchase show Passes.
- show passes can only be purchased directly from the USEF website.
- show passes can only be purchased within the 14 days before the show, or day of the show.

Horses showing in Introductory and Opportunity classes require no USEF/USDF member fees or Horse ID fees. Horses in Introduction classes are required to pay the USEF fee (USEF & drug fee). Horses in Opportunity classes only are not required to pay the USEF fee.

2024 Show Awards

Eligibility for ADA Year End Awards

To compete for ADA Year End Rider Awards

- ADA Current Rider Membership
- ADA Awards Program Fee (paid prior to earning scores)

To compete for ADA Year End Horse Awards

- ADA current Owner Membership
- ADA Horse Recording Fee (annual or lifetime)

ADA Dressage Seat Medal

Open to Junior and Amateur riders. Riders will earn a median score on two different horses at two different levels. The median score from each horse will be averaged together. This final average must be at least 60%. This award may only be earned once by any given rider/horse/horse combination. More than one rider/horse/horse combination my earn the award in any given year. Qualifications for the Medal are as follows:

- The rider must be an ADA member and have paid the ADA Awards Program Fee prior to any competition for which scores are earned.
- A rider must earn scores on two different horses and at two different levels (not necessarily consecutive levels).
- A minimum of six scores from USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competitions must be earned on each horse. If one of the test levels being ridden is FEI, only three scores will be required from that horse.
- Scores must be earned at a minimum of three shows and from three different judges.
- At least one score on each horse must be at the highest test of the level and be a minimum score of 55%. If one of the test levels being ridden is FEI, one score must be a minimum of 55%.
- No more than two of the six scores on each horse may be of Test 1 of the level; exception is FEI level.

All eligible scores will be recorded for each horse on which the rider earns scores, however, only the top two scores from each individual judge for each horse will count toward the median score calculation. If only one score is earned from an individual judge that score will count toward the median score. The scores from the highest test of the level are not required to be included in the median. The median score is the score exactly between the highest and lowest scores when all scores are ranked from highest to lowest. For an even number of scores, the two middle scores are averaged.

At The Show Awards

All show entrants are eligible to win class ribbons.

- Ribbons are awarded to 6th place for all classes. Ties will remain tied.
- High score and reserve high score ribbons will be presented for each junior, adult amateur, and open rider earning the highest score in:
 - Introductory Level
 - Training Level
 - First Level
 - Second Level
 - Third/Fourth Level
 - FEI
- A high score ribbon will be presented for the rider earning the highest score in Prix Caprilli and Musical (including Pas de Deux and quadrille) classes.

2024 Show Rules and General Information

EVERY CLASS OFFERED HEREIN WHICH IS COVERED BY THE RULES AND SPECIFICATIONS OF THE CURRENT USEF RULE BOOK WILL BE CONDUCTED AND JUDGED IN ACCORDANCE THEREWITH.

The information in this section is a summary only, competitors are strongly encouraged to read and understand the USEF Rulebook.

US EQUESTRIAN FEDERATION rules are in force from the moment show management allows access to the showgrounds. This includes conduct, correct saddlery and equipment, and attire.

Liability Statement

Horses by their inherent nature present a risk. This show, the management, the USEF Licensee, and the facility will not be responsible for any loss or damage or injury to horses exhibited, or for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may be occasioned to any person, whomsoever, by any horse owned or exhibited by said exhibitor and shall indemnify the show, the management, the show committee and volunteers, the USEF Licensee, the USEF and USDF, or any member thereof, against all claims and demands, of any nature or kind, that may grow out of any injury occasioned by any horses owned or exhibited by them, or arise from the negligence of the person in charge of any horse. All horses exhibited in this show participate entirely at the owner's risk. Neither the Organizing Committee, show volunteers and staff, the facility or its owners, USEF or USDF or their members will responsible for any damage, injury, or loss to persons, horses, or property of exhibitors or spectators. All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

Exhibitors should exercise extreme caution before medicating their horses and should be aware of the US Equestrian Federation rules governing drugs and medications. Additional Show Personnel

Veterinarian will be on call and Farrier will be on the grounds or on call. Names and contact information will be posted at the show office. First Aid available EMT/Medical Personnel on grounds during competition hours.

Alaska Dressage Association (ADA)

ADA is the licensee of the Alaska Dressage Association Shows; therefore, a majority vote of the ADA Board of Directors will be the final authority for decisions that fall outside the jurisdiction of the USEF Rules, such as determination to cancel a show due to inclement weather, disease or other circumstances.

Amateurs, Juniors, and Young Riders

For purposes of Competition in the Dressage Division: Individuals are eligible as Juniors until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 18. Individuals are eligible as Young Riders from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 16 until the end of the calendar year in which they reach the age of 21. Competitors shall compete as Adults from the beginning of the calendar year in which they age of 22. Individuals possessing current amateur certification are only eligible as Adult Amateurs from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach age 22. USEF DR 119.3. Adult Amateur cards are free to Senior Active or Life members. These cards must be renewed annually. Forms may be obtained from the Show Secretary and must be submitted one hour prior to the class. For more information see USEF GR 1306 and GR 1307.

Arenas

Competition and warm-up arenas are sand or a sand/rubber mix. All tests will be ridden in a standard sized (20m x 60m) competition arena.

Class Descriptions

<u>Opportunity:</u> Opportunity Classes are for entry-level riders. Experienced riders on green horses are directed to the USDF Introductory tests rather than Opportunity. Please be familiar with USEF Rule GR821. Horses, riders, owners, trainers and coaches participating in Opportunity classes are exempt from Federation and affiliate organization membership and Horse Identification (HID) requirements and Show Pass fees, but are required to list the Federation membership number if the participant is a member or the horse has been assigned a HID or Recording number. <u>Horses entered **only** in these classes are exempt from the Equine Drugs and Medication fee</u>.

Opportunity riders/horses will be allowed to cross enter ONLY USDF Intro Level classes. However, if a horse or rider enters the recognized, non-opportunity classes of USDF Intro Level, all USEF and USDF membership requirements and applicable fees apply for horse, rider, owner, trainer, etc.

Opportunity classes do not count towards year-end award programs.

<u>Prix Caprilli (Non-rated)</u>: A dressage test with jumps included. Appropriate protective headgear is required when jumping. It is understood that in the working gaits, a jumping horse is not expected to be as round on the bit as a competing Dressage horse. The horse must softly accept the bit and may show more "roundness" in the parts of the tests separate from the jumps. Refusals will be penalized as an error of course. Knockdowns will be penalized at the judge's discretion. In the case of a knocked down rail being in the way, the judge will ring the bell for the rider to stop without penalty. After the jump is replaced, the bell will be rung again telling the rider to continue from where he stopped. The tests may be called.

<u>Training Level Prix Caprilli:</u> is a test for horses with jumping experience showing Training Level Dressage or above - maximum height of fences 2 feet. Trot work to be done posting. Transitions into and out of the halt may be through the walk. Open to all riders except those competing solely in Introductory Level classes.

<u>First Level Prix Caprilli:</u> is a test for horses with jumping experience competing First Level and above - maximum height of fences 2'3". Unless otherwise noted, trot work may be done posting or sitting. When allowed to change leads the horse may do a flying change or change though the trot. The quality of the change is what matters. A copy of each test is included in the Appendix.

<u>ADA Championship Classes:</u> Five Championship Classes will be offered at the ADA Biggest Event Horse Show. The rider must be an ADA member and have paid the ADA Awards Program Fee to qualify. The membership and award fees must be received prior to any competition for which qualifying scores are recorded. To qualify, a minimum percentage must have been earned at a USDF/USEF show held in Alaska during the current competition year. Qualifying scores must be earned prior to the championship classes being held. Horses that qualify in more than one level are limited to competing in two consecutive levels. However, only one test may be chosen for the Third or Fourth Level class. Competitors should remember that there is a limit of three rides per day per horse including championship classes. Championship tests must be ridden from memory. Distinctive ribbons will be presented to sixth place for each of these classes. A Championship award will be presented for first place in each class. In the event of a tie, two Championship awards will be presented.

To qualify for the Championship classes:

- Training Level: One score of 55% or above in a Training Level Test 3 class.
- First Level: One score of 55% or above in a First Level Test 3 class.
- Second Level: One score of 55% or above in a Second Level Test 3 class.
- Third or Fourth Level: One score of 55% or above in a Third Level Test 3 class or one score of 55% in Fourth Level Test 3.

• FEI Level: One score of 55% in the FEI Level Test for which the rider will ride in the Championship class.

Tests to be ridden for the Championship class:

- Training Level: Training Level Test 3
- First Level: First Level Test 3
- Second Level: Second Level Test 3
- Third / Fourth Level: The rider is required to ride the highest test for the level at which he/she has qualified. (Either Third Level Test 3 or Fourth Level Test 3). If qualified at more than one level in this category, it is the rider's choice which ONE of those levels he/she will enter.
- FEI Level: FEI Level test at which the rider qualified.

Coach

A coach is is any adult or adults who receives remuneration for having or sharing the responsibility for instructing, teaching, schooling, or advising a rider, driver, handler or vaulter in equestrian skills. See also USEF GR 906.4 and GR 908.

Dressage Attire

Effective December 1, 2021 USEF Dressage Rules (DR) changes have gone into effect regarding allowed attire.

- Neatness is the first requisite. Eliminations are mandatory for all dress code violations as specified in USEF rules. Additionally, Show Management may in its discretion bar any person from entering the ring that is not suitably presented to appear before an audience. Please reference USEF DR-120 for detailed descriptions, and view a <u>Visual Guide to 2022 Dressage Attire</u>.
- Coats and Jackets A short riding jacket is permitted at any level of competition. A tailcoat is permitted in all classes above Fourth level. Any single-color jacket/tailcoat is permitted and may have subtle pin striping, checks or tweeds. Tasteful and discreet accents are acceptable.
- Breeches and Jodhpurs White, light, or dark colored breeches or jodhpurs are permitted in competition. Bright colors or patterns are not permitted. Contrast piping is allowed.
- Shirts and Neckwear Shirts with tie, choker, stock tie, or integrated stand-up collar are required. Ties, chokers, or stock ties may be any color.
- Boots & Half Chaps For tests or classes at Fourth level or below, riders may wear tall boots or paddock/jodhpur boots with half-chaps or garters, matching the color of their boots, and made of smooth leather or leather-like material. Tall English-style riding boots are required above Fourth Level. Boots of coordinating color(s), with or without accents, are permitted.
- Gloves- White or light-colored gloves are recommended and any solid color is permitted at Fourth Level and below. Black, brown, or white gloves are required in FEI tests or levels.
- Management may announce prior to or during a competition that competitors can show without jackets due to extreme heat and/or humidity. If jackets are waived, competitors must wear a shirt with sleeves and collar, without neckwear, and without bold pattern. Eliminations are mandatory for all dress code violations as specified in USEF rules.
- Saddle pads When used, saddle pads should be white or of conservative color (not bright, shiny or reflective). Contrast color and piping are permitted. Striped or multi-colored pads are not permitted.

Dressage Show Protocol

Competitors are notified that any act of discourtesy to the judge or officials by themselves on the part of owner, lessee, agent, trainer, coach or groom shall disqualify the horse, and all entry and other fees shall be forfeited.

In all Dressage classes, competitors must be ready to enter the arena at the scheduled time. Failure to begin the test within 45 seconds after the judge's signal results in elimination. No rider will be required to ride before the scheduled time.

Assigned numbers must be worn at all times when a horse is being exercised or ridden. Numbers may be placed on the bridle, halter, boots or saddle pad.

One whip no longer than 47.2 inches (120 cm), including the lash, may be carried during warm-up and in all USEF recognized classes. See USEF DR 120.6.

An English type saddle with stirrups is compulsory for Federation and USDF tests. In Training, First and Second Level tests, a plain snaffle bridle with a noseband is required. In Third and Fourth Level tests, a double bridle may be used. For more specifics on equipment requirements, see USEF DR 121.

Most tests may be called during the competition. ADA Championship tests, FEI tests and Freestyle rides must be ridden from memory. Announcing the tests is limited to reading the movement as it is written, once only.

Show management reserves to itself the power to prohibit any person from attending or showing a horse in the ring and to remove any groom or horse from the show without being liable for compensation.

No person will be allowed in the show ring during the time of judging except the exhibitor and those having official or requested duties to perform.

ATTENTION COMPETITORS

Each competitor is responsible for supplying management with correct applicable numbers (USDF and USEF) for horse, owner, rider, and trainer, before the day(s) of the competition.

The scores of the competitors who fail to supply correct numbers may not be counted toward national awards.

Entries

Closing dates published on the title page **WILL BE ENFORCED. Telephone, text, fax or email entries will not be accepted**. No entry will be accepted without payment of fees. All competitors, by completing their entry, acknowledge and attest that they have read and understood all terms of these rules wherever listed in this prize list.

Entries must include the following to be complete. (**Remember there is a \$30.00 incomplete entry fee**).

Late entry fees

Any entry received by the show secretary after the closing date of the show is considered late. A late entry fee of \$50 will be assessed.

After ride times are assigned no late entries will be accepted. Ride times will be available 48 hours before the start of the show.

Post entry fees

Any entry already accepted into an ADA show that wishes to add an additional class may do so for the standard class fee if space is available (e.g. to fill a scratch).

Facility and Directions

William Clark Chamberlin Equestrian Center (WCCEC) is located at 3900 Abbott Road, Anchorage, AK 99511.

Take the Dimond Boulevard exit off the New Seward Highway and travel east. Dimond Boulevard becomes Abbott Road. Continue east through the Lake Otis intersection and on Abbott Road. The William Clark Chamberlin Equestrian Center is on the south side of Abbott Road ³/₄ Miles east of the Lake Otis intersection.



Competitors are responsible for knowing and obeying all of the rules and regulations of the WCCEC.

- No alcoholic beverages are allowed.
- Dogs must be on leash and under direct control at all times. No dogs allowed between barns when horses are present.

Food

Food will be available for purchase on the show grounds.

Headgear

Any rider must wear protective head gear from the time horses are officially admitted to the competition grounds by competition management, anyone mounted on a horse at any time on the competition grounds, including non-competing riders, riders on non-competing horses, mounted participants in exhibition classes and those competing in all classes and those competing in all classes and those competing in classes and those competing in all classes and those competing in all classes and those in compliance with GR801.

Protective headgear is defined as a riding helmet which meets or exceeds American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) / Safety Equipment Institute (SEI) standards for equestrian use and carries the SEI tag. The headgear and harness must be secured and properly fitted. Any rider violating this rule at any time must immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is properly in place. See USEF DR 120.

It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian or trainer of the junior exhibitor to see to it that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition, and the Federation, Show Committee, and Licensed Officials are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance per USEF GR 801.7.

Horse Identification Number

Refer to the <u>USDF Recognition page</u> found in the Appendix.

Musical Freestyles

Dressage musical freestyle is an exciting combination of the technical and artistic aspects of classical dressage. To foster the highest possible technical quality in freestyle performances, competitors are required to enter a freestyle class only at the level at which they have already demonstrated proficiency. Refer to USEF Rules, DR 129.9 (Effective December 1, 2019):

Except for USEF/USDF Championship classes and for FEI Pony Riders, FEI Junior and Young Rider Freestyles, in order to enter a freestyle class at any level, a horse/rider combination must have received a minimum score of 63% for Training through Fourth levels and 60% for FEI levels in the highest test of the declared freestyle level or any test of a higher level at a USEF/USDF licensed Dressage Competition, Federation Licensed or FEI recognized Dressage Competition or "open" Dressage class (i.e. open to all breeds) at a Federation Licensed Competition held prior to the competition where the horse/rider combination is entered to ride a freestyle class. A photocopy of the test verifying eligibility or copy of the USDF score verification must be submitted with the entry for a freestyle class.

For verification, access https://www.usdf.org/usdfscores/

The time for sound tests will be posted in the show office, and on the schooling schedules. Sound tests are mandatory for freestyle competitions.

Non-Competing Horse Entries

Horses brought onto the grounds but not entered in the show must be registered with the Show Office and will be given a number to be worn at all times outside of the stall. Non-competing horse entries are subject to the same rules as competing horses with additional restrictions on times and general use of any facility amenities. Any person(s) riding a horse within show grounds must have signed an official entry blank and/or release form. Appropriate stall fees and a \$30 non-competing horse fee per show must be paid in addition to the Office fee for each show. Horses entered as non-competing but later converted to class entries must pay all additional fees as required for entry.

Parking

Vehicles are allowed to load and unload horses and equipment in the barn area before and after clinics or competition with due caution for horses and riders present. No unattended or unauthorized vehicles may be parked between barns. Vehicles are required to park in designated parking areas. No electrical hook-ups are permitted to unauthorized campers from barns. Vehicles are not allowed beyond the parking lots during a clinic or competition, except to provide handicapped access. Please use the wheelbarrows to move equipment while a show or clinic is in progress.

Refunds

Refunds will **only** be made for **class fees** as follows. All other fees are non-refundable. A full refund of class fees will be presented to the competitor if a veterinarian's certificate is presented for any horse entered in the show to the Show Management within three days after the show has ended. A veterinarian's certificate must be presented for <u>each show</u> for which a competitor is requesting a refund. A horse is considered entered in the show after the closing date. USEF GR 1507. If the show is canceled by Show Management for any reason, ADA will refund 50% of class fees upon written request by the exhibitor within 10 days of the cancellation. **No refunds** will be presented for illness or injury to the rider, but rider substitutions will be allowed as described in USEF GR 1506. **No refunds** will be given if right to compete is denied because the Vaccination record is missing or incomplete. USEF GR 845.

Ride Times

Tentative ride times will be available 48 hours before the start of the show.

Official ride times will be posted by the office by noon the day before the competition. Ride times will not be changed after noon the day before the start of the competition except in compliance with GR 830.5. Times will not be changed unless dire need is demonstrated, and there is an equitable solution among all riders affected.

It is the competitor's responsibility to obtain updated official ride times upon their arrival to the show grounds **each show day**.

Safe Sport

Reminder: All USEF Life and Senior Active members, as well as participants who have regular contact with minor athletes, are required to comply with the U.S. Center for Safe Sport training requirement to be eligible to participate in the competition. All participants must adhere to the U.S. Center for Safe Sport Code, USEF Safe Sport Policy, and the Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies. More information about these can be found at <u>www.usef.org</u>.

Schooling

Official schooling for all participants is in the dressage arena from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. the afternoon and evening prior to the show. **Please be considerate of other riders**. Schooling in the dressage arena **is not allowed** the day of the show, or during arena set up. Lunging is permitted in designated areas with a lunge line and if **no riders are present**. Use of other unreserved areas of the facility **requires** WCCEC membership or day use pass.

Scratches & No Shows

Scratches and no shows are official only when made to the Show Secretary by the competitor or their representative. <u>Scratches made to warm-up or ring stewards are not official</u>. Failure to notify of scratches may result in disqualification for the remainder of the show.

Show Office Hours

Open one hour prior to the first ride each day and will close one-half hour after the last class of the day. The day before the competition the office will be open from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Stabling

Stall fees are \$25 per night. Bedding is required but is <u>not</u> included in the stall fee. Anchorage Horse Council rules state that <u>no paper</u> or <u>straw bedding</u> is allowed. Stall fees will not be refunded under any circumstances. If a horse occupies a stall for any portion of a day, the full fee is due. A separate check made out to ADA for a stall deposit fee of \$50 per show weekend must accompany your entry form. The check will be returned to you after show management has checked you out of your stall prior to your departure from the grounds.

Stabling is available after 3:00 p.m. the afternoon prior to the show. All stalls are 10' by 12' box type with full doors.

All horses not stabled must be personally attended to or enclosed in a trailer. No loose horses.

Any horse tied to a trailer requires an adult in attendance at all times. There may be no more than 5 Feet of rope between the halter and the trailer of the tied horse.Whether your horse is stabled or not please pickup all trash and manure daily around your trailer.

For any horses left on the show grounds overnight, the owner or their representative must also stay on the grounds.

Tests

The current USEF/USDF dressage tests will be used. The USEF Dressage Tests can be downloaded from the following URL:

Trainer

A trainer is any adult who has the responsibility for the care, training, custody, or performance of a horse. Said person must be a USEF Senior Active Member and sign the entry form of any Licensed Competition whether said person be an owner, rider, agent, and/or coach as well as trainer. Where a minor exhibitor has no trainer, a parent or guardian must sign and assume responsibility of trainer. The name of the trainer must be designated as such on the entry form. Additionally, the designated trainer of each entry must be present on show grounds during the Licensed Competition. USEF GR 147.

All questions not covered in these rules and regulations shall be decided by the show management whose decision shall be final.

B. USDF Recognition Page

USDF Membership Benefits: USDF is dedicated to education, the recognition of achievement, and promotion of dressage. For details on member benefits, including educational programs, awards, and other opportunities, refer to the USDF Member Guide or the USDF website at www.usdf.org.

This competition is recognized by USDF for 2024

<u>Membership Requirements for USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized Competitions</u>: Owners and riders, including foreign riders and owners who are not residents of the US, wishing to participate in a USEF-licensed/USDFrecognized competition as a rider or owner/lessee, must have either a USDF Group Membership (GM), Participating Membership (PM), or have a USDF Non-Member (NM) identification number and pay the USDF Non-Member (NM) fee. (Note: USDF Business Members can own horses but cannot compete as riders with their USDF Business Membership.)

Horses competing at USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competitions must have either a USDF Horse Identification (HID) number or a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR). Proper credentials or verification certificates must be presented to the competition secretary.

Riders and owners wishing to participate in a USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competition, and not able to present the competition secretary with verification of a USDF membership or NM identification, and USDF LHR or USDF HID, must complete a USDF Competition Affidavit Form and pay the \$5 affidavit filing fee. A copy of a completed affidavit form from another competition may also be used for verification purposes for up to 60 days. (Exception: Affidavits cannot be used at Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Dressage Championships.)

Exceptions:

- Horses competing only in Individual Breed Classes (IBCs) at DSHB competitions, sires and dams of horses in DSHB group classes, where those sires or dams are not actually competing in the same competition, horses competing only in breed restricted dressage or DSHB classes at Regular Competitions (e.g. all Arabian, all Friesian, or all Morgan classes), or in USDF Introductory Level tests, pas de deux or quadrille, are exempt from this requirement. Also exempt are horses ridden in leadline, exhibitions, games and races, classes for 4-H members, walk-trot, academy, and opportunity classes.
- Riders and owners/lessees competing only in classes which are exempt from the USDF HID requirements are also exempt from the USDF NM identification number and NM fee requirements. Also exempt are handlers of horses competing in DSHB In-Hand or Group classes.

Memberships Defined

Participating Membership (PM): A membership issued to an individual directly by USDF. The membership year is December 1 through November 30. PMs are available for 1-year (\$90), 5-years (\$360), or life (\$1,800). A USDF Youth Participating Membership (YPM) is available for individuals who have not reached their 21st birthday by December 1 of the current membership year (\$72). A PM allows the member to compete at USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competitions and to participate as a rider and/or owner/lessee for all Adequan®/USDF Year-End Awards and the Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Dressage Championship program.

Group Membership (GM): A membership issued to an individual by USDF when the member name and dues are submitted to USDF through an affiliate Group Member Organization (GMO). The GM year begins December 1 and ends November 30. A GM allows the member to compete at USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competitions and participate in the USDF Rider Awards Program and the USDF Regional Schooling Show Awards Program.

Business Membership (BM): A membership that runs December 1 through November 30 and is issued to a business or organization directly by USDF. The USDF BM (\$240) offers a wider variety of advertising benefits. BMs satisfy requirements of horse ownership only.

Non-Member (NM) Identification Number: For each USDF NM owner/lessee and USDF NM rider there will be a USDF NM fee of \$35 per competition that must be collected by the show secretary and submitted to USDF, along with the USDF Report of Fees document and the \$5 affidavit fee and Competition Affidavit Form if the person cannot provide a copy of their USDF NM card. Owners/ lessees or riders exempt from the NM number requirements are also exempt from paying the USDF NM fee. If there are multiple owners of a horse and all are NMs, only one of the owners must pay the NM fee. If the horse has at least one owner who is a current USDF PM, GM, or BM there is no NM fee assessed. Competition management will be invoiced for all applicable USDF NM fees not received with the USDF post-competition paperwork, along with a report listing all USDF NMs. Competition management is then

required to submit the NM fees within 30 days to the USDF. An individual with a USDF NM identification number is not eligible for any USDF membership benefits. Once a USDF NM number has been assigned, a USDF NM card can be obtained from the USDF website.

Horse Identification (HID) Number: A one-time tracking number for horses (\$35). Scores earned by a horse with an HID number will be recorded but will NOT be counted towards Adequan®/USDF Year-End Awards. A horse with an HID number is not eligible to compete in Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional qualifying or championship classes. An HID number can be upgraded to a Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR) for a fee of \$80. If a horse has a USDF LHR it does not need an HID number. An HID number is a one-time fee that does not need to be renewed.

Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR): A horse with an LHR (\$115) is eligible for Adequan®/USDF Year-End Awards, and eligible to compete in Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional qualifying and championship classes, assuming requirements for the owner and rider are met. If a horse has an LHR it does not need an HID number. An LHR does not need to be renewed.

How to Join USDF

Applications for USDF Participating Membership (PM), Business Membership (BM), Horse Identification (HID) number, and Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR) may be found in the following locations:

- On the USDF website: <u>www.usdf.org</u>. You can submit the application online or download the form. In the show office at USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized competitions classified by USEF as Dressage Competitions, and Regular Competitions which are open to all breeds.

The effective date of membership is the date the form and correct fees are received in the USDF office or, if applying at a competition, the date accepted by the competition secretary, provided the application is signed and dated by the competition secretary, member, and/or horse owner on that same day.

Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program

The USDF Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program recognizes adult amateurs competing in equitation and promotes correct seat, position, and use of the aids in dressage. An Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final class presented by Big Dee's Tack and Vet Supply will be held in conjunction with each of the nine USDF Regional Dressage Championship competitions, providing adult amateurs with additional opportunity for

recognition. Ribbons awarded through 8th Place and gift certificates awarded to top four riders.

Adult amateurs wishing to qualify to compete in an Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final may do so by meeting the following requirements.

Qualifying Requirements

To be eligible for the USDF Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final class, rider must have

a) Earned a score of 70% or higher in any dressage seat equitation class (except walk/trot) at a USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized Dressage competition within the qualifying period of the applicable regional championship.

<u>or</u>

b) Qualified to compete in any regional dressage championship class (excluding freestyles).

Membership Requirements

- Rider must have a USDF Participating Membership at the time the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Rider must be an adult amateur, in accordance with GR1306 of the USEF rules, and be designated with USEF as an adult amateur when the score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Owner must have a USDF Participating or Business Membership when the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Horse must have a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration when the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.

The USDF Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program rules and information can be found on the USDF <u>website</u>.



2024 Great American Insurance Group / USDF Regional Dressage Championships

A single Regional Dressage Championship program organized by the United States Dressage Federation (USDF), and recognized by the United States Equestrian Federation, Inc. (USEF), will be held in each of the nine USDF regions. In addition, Alaska and Hawaii may each hold state championships if an official request from a Group Member Organization (GMO) is received by April 1 of the prior year. The Regional Championship Program Rules can be found on the USDF website at <u>www.usdf.org</u>. Please refer to the 2024 USDF Member Guide for the comprehensive list of rules and requirements for this program.

Membership/Registration Requirements for Qualifying and Championships

All memberships and registrations/recordings must be correct and current at the time qualifying scores are earned and at the time of the championships.

Rider:

- Must have a USDF Participating* Membership (PM).
- Must have a USEF membership (Active, or Life).

Horse:

- Must have a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration (LHR).
- Must have a USEF (Annual or Lifetime) Membership.
- USDF horse registration and USEF horse recording must be in the name(s) of the current owner(s) or lessee(s).
- A horse is not required to have breed registry papers.

Owner:

Must have a USDF Participating or Business Membership and a USEF membership (Active or Life Membership or Annual or Life Recorded Farm/Business). If the horse has more than one owner, at least one owner must have both active USEF membership and active USDF membership and active USDF Participating or Business Membership and must be the owner of record with USEF and USDF. For a business or farm to be the valid owner under this requirement, it must be listed as an owner of the horse with both USEF and USDF.

*PMs are USDF members who join USDF directly. USDF Group Members (GM) are ineligible.

Minimum Qualifying Scores: One set of nationally-standardized qualifying scores has been established for all USEF/USDF Regional Championships, for Training level through Grand Prix, in three divisions: open, adult amateur and junior/young rider. FEI Junior and FEI Young Rider classes have only one respective division.

Membership Statement

Life, senior active and junior active members shall be eligible to participate in all classes at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Modified Level or above and Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Reining and Vaulting Competitions and Endurance Rides. A non-member may participate as a handler, rider, driver, owner, lessee, or agent at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions, Dressage Competitions, Reining Competitions and Combined Driving Competitions upon payment of a Show Pass fee. Participants in the following classes are exempted from the Requirements of this rule: 1) leadline; 2) exhibitions; 3) games and races; 4) classes for 4-H members; 5) walk trot and academy classes (academy classes are classes limited to horses used regularly in a lesson program); 6) USDF introductory level tests, pas de deux and quadrille classes; 7) assistant handlers in Dressage Sport Horse Breeding classes.

Motorized Vehicles

Minors who do not have a valid driver's license which allows them to operate a motorized vehicle in the state in which they reside will not be permitted to operate a motorized vehicle of any kind, including, but not limited to, golf carts, motorcycles, scooters, or farm utility vehicles, on the competition grounds of licensed competitions. Minors who have a valid temporary license may operate the above described motorized vehicles as long as they are accompanied by an adult with a valid driver's license. The parent/legal guardian or individual who signs the entry blank as a parent or guardian of a minor operating a motorized vehicle in violation of this rule are solely responsible for any damages, claims, losses or actions resulting from that operation. Violations of this rule will be cause for penalties against those responsible for the child committing the offense. Wheelchairs and other mobility assistance devices for individuals with disabilities are exempt from this rule.

The unsafe use of personal electronic transport devices, as determined by the competition officials and management in their sole discretion, that do not require a driver's license to operate, including but not limited to segways, hover boards, and single wheeled scooters is prohibited on competition grounds. Operating such devices in areas where people gather may be deemed "unsafe use" if there is a risk of harm to others. If the operator of the device is a minor, the parent/legal guardian or individual who signs the entry blank as a parent or guardian of a minor operating the device in violation of this rule is accountable and may be subject to penalties. Wheelchairs and other mobility assistance devices for individuals with disabilities are exempt from this rule.

Sharps Containers

In accordance with the 1989 Federal Waste Tracking Act, which restricts the disposal of medical waste, bio-hazardous medical waste containers will be provided on the show grounds. All exhibitors and their agents are responsible for the proper disposal of this waste.

USEF GR844 Equine Vaccination Rule

1. At Federation licensed competitions horses, more than 7 months of age, entering the grounds must be accompanied by documentation of Equine Influenza Virus and Equine Herpes Virus (Rhinopneumonitis) vaccinations within six months prior to entering the stables. Horses not in compliance with this rule may be required to leave the competition grounds upon request by Competition Management. Documentation should consist of one of the following methods mentioned below. The frequency of vaccine administration should be per the vaccine manufacturers' or veterinarian's recommendations. It is recommended that vaccines are administered by or under the direction of a veterinarian.

2. In the case of vaccines administered by a veterinarian, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide documentation from the veterinarian on documenting that the horse in question received the vaccinations; name of the vaccines and date of vaccine administration.

3. In the case of vaccines administered by a person other than a veterinarian, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide a receipt of the vaccine purchase which is signed by the owner, or agent with care, custody, and control of the horse; name, serial number and expiration date of the vaccine; and date of vaccine administration.

4. In the case of a horse that is unable to receive either of the vaccinations due to a history of adverse reactions, the exhibitor, upon request by Competition Management, must provide a letter from the veterinarian on official letterhead stating that the horse in question cannot be vaccinated due to medical concerns and a log of temperatures taken twice daily for the seven days prior to entering the competition grounds. These horses must also have their temperature taken and logged twice daily while on the competition grounds. The log of temperatures should be provided to the Competition Management, steward, or technical delegate when requested.

5. Competition Management may not amend or enhance vaccination requirements without prior approval of the Veterinary Committee.

USDF Statement on Animal Welfare

The United States Dressage Federation, Inc. (USDF), a federation of individual members and over 100 independent organizations throughout the United States, supports the concept of ethical treatment of animals.

Dressage is a classical method of training horses, based upon the horse's natural responses, as carried out in a gradual, planned program during which the horse's athletic abilities are improved in a systematic manner. As a result, the horse becomes capable, comfortable, and responsive in partnership with the rider without the use of force. Dressage competition at various levels of achievement is the ultimate test of the training program to determine whether the desired harmony between horse and rider has been achieved.

The rules pertaining to dressage competition prohibit the use of artificial appliances, training aids, and drugs, which would force the horse to submit. Instead, the emphasis is upon training and a cooperative partnership with the rider. Major competitions are carefully monitored to assure that there is no unnecessary force or harshness displayed.

Unlike other horse sports in which horses enter training at a relatively immature state, dressage training is usually not seriously begun until the horse is three or four. The top levels of achievement require five or more years of progressive training and it is not unusual to see horses in international competition in their late teens. This, in itself, places a premium on good care and soundness throughout the horse's life.

While supporting the concept of animal welfare in its broadest form, the United States Dressage Federation, Inc., also recognizes that it is unrealistic to ascribe human emotions and responses to the horse which in its wild state is a creature of flight, living a hard and precarious existence. Under domestication, the horse is assured of ample food, water, and shelter, as well as protection against infectious diseases and damaging parasites, thus leading a longer and healthier life with a high rate of survival.

As an educational organization, USDF has numerous programs, which teach people how to pursue the accepted, humane training methods. A program of certifying instructors also emphasizes protecting the horse's welfare in pursuit of dressage training.
